

The Mana'olana (Hope) Program offers free comprehensive case management and outreach to all children and families who are survivors of human trafficking. The program also screens/assesses the risk of human trafficking and provides linkages to community resources through a culturally responsive approach.

Eligibility:

Families of Indigenous descent (American Indians, Alaska Natives, Native Hawaiians and/or Pacific Islanders) who identify as a victim or at risk of human trafficking, residing in Waimanalo community, on the Island of Oʻahu.

Services:

- Trafficking Screening
- Assessment
- Service Planning
- Linkages to Resources and Community Providers
- Safety Planning
- Community outreach and training
- Trainings on human trafficking for community partners
