Root Cause: Lack of Deeply Affordable Homes

- Drug use and mental illness are not driving homelessness
- Hawaii has low rates of addiction and mental illness
- Hawaii has the largest gap between wages and housing costs

Five Priorities

- 1. Deeply Affordable Communities Conventional Housing
- 2. Deeply Affordable Communities Kauhale
- 3. Space for Mental Health & Substance Use Healing
- 4. Clear Obstacles in the Continuum of Care
- 5. Flip NIMBY to YIMBY to Support all of the Above

Deeply Affordable Space – Kauhale

Kauhale – lasting affordability, rooted in community and kuleana

- Intentionally designed and operated to build community
- Demonstrate new, cost-effective models of housing and healing
- Communal space for cooking, dining, recreation, agriculture, or other
- Residents take care of place
 e.g., security, groundskeeping, maintenance, improvement projects
- Residents take care of people
 e.g., look after kupuna or disabled, peer navigation/support
- Community within community build relationships with housed neighbors
- Not just tiny home villages repurposed hotel, office, dorm, apartment
- Not traditional services build resident capacity, reduce need for services

\$15M

- 12 village in the next 3 years
- 6 Oahu, 2 each Neighbor Isle County
- Operating costs decrease as community takes kuleana
